It's important to note that honors courses can satisfy both general education requirements, and, in certain cases, specific bachelor's degree requirements (indicated by a two-letter code) that are necessary to complete an undergraduate degree. We highly recommend that new students think about enrolling in a 3-credit HONOR course during their first semester, as well as enroll in your learning community (Ideas that Matter). 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## **Honors Learning Community Requirement**

As of the 2022-2023 academic year, all incoming honors students have a 4-year learning community requirement.

The **first-year learning community** is designed to assist first-year students in their transition to college, providing support for their academic, emotional, and social needs. Students can meet their first-year learning community requirement through Ideas that Matter.

• Ideas that Matter is credit-bearing year-long colloquium that allows first-year students at the University of Utah to explore ideas that can help frame their educational experiences and opportunities. In the Fall semester, students will enroll in HONOR 1010 (1.5 credits) and in the Spring semester, they will take HONOR 1020 (1.5 credits). Both classes will meet for 80 minutes per week. By successfully completing both HONOR 1010 and 1020, students will earn three credits towards their honors core requirements whil also fulfilling the first-year learning community requirement.

The **second-year learning community** aims to connect students to the larger University of Utah campus or broader Salt Lake community. There are four pathways available for students to meet their second-year learning community requirement. More information about these pathways will be provided in Spring of 2025.

The **third** and **fourth-year learning communities** aim to assist students in their preparation for the thesis process. Specifically, the third-year learning community is designed to provide support for students as they progress towards conceptualizing their thesis and submitting a thesis proposal. Since the thesis can vary greatly across different majors, the third-year learning community focuses on the essential steps that every student must eventually complete and emphasizes the importance of department engagement in meeting individual deadlines. This is accomplished through module-based resources that encourage students to interact with information about thesis mentors, formulate questions, and understand deadlines. Moreover, each module concludes with a reflection exercise that allows students to contemplate the steps they have already taken or are planning to take.

### **First-Year Learning Community Description**

#### HONOR 1010: Ideas that Matter

This year-long colloquium introduces first-year Honors students to ideas that can help frame their educational experiences and opportunities at the University of Utah. The course is based on students' participation in seminar-style discussions around major societal challenges and the meaning of a good life. This first-semester course emphasizes experiential learning through deep listening across diverse perspectives and interdisciplinary perspectives around broad challenges (wicked problems and wild opportunities embedded in climate change and proposals about how we can respond to that change) and lays a framework for students to think about their educations at a meta-level and in relation to major societal challenges. Students are required to connect and engage with assigned readings and their conversations with one another by writing systematically in a reflective journal. In addition, students develop a graduation plan, and are connected with a team of mentors and a cohort of Honors peers.

### **Ideas that Matter Course Registration – HONOR 1010**

- 2) Add a block in your schedule for one of the available HONOR 1010 sections Days & Times (listed below).
- 3) Confirm that the course information matches your selection and continue to complete registration.
